Age restriction	Opera Software has no services that target users under 18 years, and thus no deployment for age appropriate privacy settings. Windows Live allows anyone to create a Windows Live ID account and use the Windows Live services in accordance with the Microsoft Service Agreement. All new Windows Live ID accounts have a default setting of "Private".
Data sharing	N/A	For Game Center, users are prompted to enter their birthdate. If under 13, they are prompted to send the terms and conditions to parents before agreeing, and will be given a username (not your real name), which is recommended also not to be their real name. Under 13's are also given the choice to allow game invites to be sent to them, and if friends of friends can see them (the default is off).	All new accounts have a default setting of "Private". The "Private" setting makes a customer's information and activities visible only to a customer's friends, and non-friends will not find that customer's profile in search results, or see the customer's information. Existing Windows Live users have the ability to select their own privacy setting from three choices: Public, Limited or Private to determine how they share their information.
Parental control	The privacy policy includes a section on "Children's guidelines" that basically explains that Opera has no method to confirm the users' age and parents should be involved.	All iOS devices have the possibility to set restrictions via the settings menu. These restrictions are also protected with a passcode which is set by the parent. You can choose to restrict access to several applications and features on the device, of which the following are relevant for privacy: Safari, YouTube, Camera (also disables FaceTime), FaceTime, Ping, Installing apps, Deleting apps, Multiplayer games in Game Center and Adding friends in Game Center	Windows 8 includes Family Safety. From the moment the child's Windows user account is created, Family Safety gives parents meaningful insight into how their children use the computer to access the internet, play games and run applications. Should parents decide to set boundaries, Family Safety provides easy to use options that let parents turn on web filtering, set time limits, or restrict the type of games and apps their child can use.
